



Who Implements the Vision?

FAQ Question 7: What events led to the AFC Vision project?

The first major event that led to what is now the AFC Vision process was an informal proposal from Snowbird Resort to expand resort operations in American Fork Canyon

State and local governments began to consider Snowbird's ideas, and quickly realized the requirement to consider Snowbird's questions in the context of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). They requested \$500,000 in funding from the Utah State Legislature in 2014. The Legislature allocated \$100,000 to undertake a higher-level public "Vision" to consider a broader range of questions in the canyon, and to engage the public far in advance of developing funding for a specific NEPA project.

The Vision is now being run to develop high-level policy direction for dealing with private land proposals and public land management needs in the project area.



Do you love American Fork Canyon? You're in good company. The canyon is a natural playground for an estimated 1.2 million people each year, with Timpanogos Cave National Monument alone attracting 120,000. American Fork Canyon's clean air, challenging terrain, dramatic vistas, and proximity to the city make it an easy escape for a variety of outdoor activities.




While most people associate American Fork Canyon with destinations like Timpanogos Cave, Mount Timpanogos, and the Alpine Loop Scenic Byway, it has many other recreation activities to offer. Did you know the canyon provides access to two Congressionally-designated Wilderness areas? That it provides expert rock-climbing terrain and is considered by many the birthplace of American sport climbing? That it attracts ATV and horse owners from throughout the region since these activities are not allowed in Salt Lake County's portion of the Central Wasatch? That many road cyclists challenge the Alpine Loop daily while fly fisherman seek quiet stretches of the American Fork River? It may sit in Utah County's back yard, but American Fork Canyon is a treasure for the region, the state of Utah, and the nation.

Here's the challenge: The population of Salt Lake and Utah Counties will reach a combined 2.5 million people by 2040, compared with 1.5 million today. This increase will put substantial new pressure on the canyon and its transportation, environmental, and recreation systems. As the canyon becomes more heavily used, conflicts between uses and users will emerge and grow. Can you imagine canyon use almost doubling? How will people move around, where will they park, and what activities should be available to them? How do we protect resources and the quality of user




Proposed Blueprint
