## **Executive Summary**

#### **1. Introduction**

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) entitlement program allocates annual grants to larger cities and urban counties to develop viable communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expansion of economic opportunities, principally for low- and moderate-income persons. The national objectives of the CDBG are to benefit low- and moderate-income families, prevent creation of or eliminate slum and blight, and serve urgent needs. The Annual Action Plan is a collaborative process whereby a community establishes a unified vision for community development actions.

As an entitlement city, Orem receives CDBG funding from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). This funding is allocated to jurisdictions and organizations in the region to carry out community development projects that align with CDBG goals and consolidated plan priorities.

#### **2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan**

The goals Orem City will meet through its planned activities for FY24 are Public Services to LMI Families, Public Facilities and Improvements, Neighborhood Revitalization, Economic Development, Affordable Housing, and Efficient Oversight and Operations. #### **3. Evaluation of past performance**

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

Last year, Mountainland Association of Governments took over the administration of the Orem CDBG program. Through our partnership with Orem City, we strive to strengthen the CDBG program through our shared commitment to building solid partnerships. MAG staff have worked to cultivate a collaborative relationship between HUD, city staff, adjacent local government representatives, and

non-profit organizations in order to provide quality services and programs to low and moderate-income residents of the city. Through our 2024 Risk-Based Technical Assistance monitoring with HUD staff, we aim to build on the progress we have already made in resolving existing IDIS flags to close out the few remaining outstanding findings from previous monitorings. At the end of each program year, the city evaluates progress in meeting program objectives. This information is presented to citizens in the form of a Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report. MAG's first CAPER for Orem City will be published mid-2024, and will be posted on our website, [mountainland.org](http://mountainland.org).

#### **4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process**

In preparing the FY 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan, the City of Orem worked with the four other area entitlements to solicit community input on the plan priorities. The following activities were conducted:

- Civicus Consulting Group was hired to prepare necessary documents for the consolidated plan and to help the entitlements identify housing and other needs and priorities in the community. The documents include: Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing, Housing Market Analysis, and Housing Needs Assessment. Civicus staff did research, conducted interviews and surveys, held focus groups, etc. to help prepare this beneficial information for the public entities.
- A priority survey was sent out to the community in English and Spanish via social media and email. 593 responses were received with 57% of the responses coming from Orem residents.
- Local service providers were asked to administer paper surveys to LMI clients.
- A facilitated discussion with local service providers was held to help to better determine community needs and priorities. The providers represented diverse groups of people and areas of focus.
- City Councils and the County Commission participated in informational and priority setting activities.

The City of Orem also relied heavily on the input of a group of citizen volunteers known as the CDBG Citizen Advisory Commission (CAC). The CAC consists of six Orem residents who are appointed by the City Council and represent various interests, walks of life, and geographic locations in Orem.

The City of Orem also relied heavily on the input of a group of citizen volunteers known as the CDBG Citizen Advisory Commission (CAC). The CAC consists of six Orem residents who are appointed by the City Council and represent various interests, walks of life, and geographic locations in Orem. Priority-setting meetings were held with the CDBG Advisory Commission, City Council, and local service providers.

Additionally, for the 2024 program year a draft of the Annual Action Plan was sent to city managers, economic development staff, and chambers of commerce in the region to request input from civic and business leaders. MAG, Orem City, and CDBG staff will work throughout the year to create the program. The application, scoring, and project selection process will be revised and improved as necessary to ensure that the best projects are selected each year. MAG will also work to communicate with

organizations that serve needs identified in the Consolidated Plan and encourage them to apply to reach the goals outlined therein. CDBG staff will work to continually vet and discover potential sub-recipients, especially those that serve low- and moderate-income individuals.

MAG sits on the review subcommittee for the Continuum of Care. This subcommittee is made up of individuals in the community who have interest in the Continuum of Care process but are not an applicant for the funding cycle of HUD's NOFA. This committee uses CoC established criteria to thoroughly review and score applications to ensure strong applications in response to identified community gaps and needs. MAG also sits on the Executive Committee of the Continuum, which sets strategic planning priorities and collaboration opportunities for Continuum members.

The funds are instead allocated to organizations that provide LMI individuals and families living in Orem with supportive services. The City also allocates rehabilitation funding throughout the city to LMI homeowners in need. Code enforcement and public improvements and facilities funding is allocated geographically and is used for projects and enforcement in CDBG eligible neighborhoods. These neighborhoods were currently updated due to newly released 2020 Census data and include Cherry Hill, Stonewood, Lakeridge, Sharon Park, Geneva, and Orem North.

### **Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically**

City leadership and management agreed that non-public service CDBG funding in targeted neighborhoods is the best and most impactful use for the funding.

### **Discussion**

These LMI neighborhoods are aging, have increasing crime and nuisance rates, and are starting to suffer from overall decline. By investing in these neighborhoods, the City has been able revitalize them, helping to reduce the need for city services, improving safety and security, increasing homeownership, and providing for a better quality of life for residents living in the areas.



## **AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing -91.420, 91.220(j)**

### **Introduction**

Unfortunately, there are some significant barriers to affordable housing in our City and area wide. Like most communities throughout the nation, the City of Orem is in the middle of an affordable housing crisis. Housing prices and rental rates in Utah County have exploded to all-time high. This along with low vacancy rates, lack of available units in the area, and the recent health pandemic has created some real challenges for LMI families and almost anyone who is trying to find affordable rentals and those trying to get into their first home. While there has been a significant increase in rental units available over the last few years, most of these units were built at market rate with high rents.

Additionally, the idea of affordable housing has become very political. Currently, there is a strong sentiment in the community against building any new multi-family housing projects and limiting other housing types. Orem is also aging and many of the older neighborhoods are becoming centers for short and long time rentals. Several of the landlords do not maintain their properties, violate city occupancy rules, and charge market rate or more for their units. This is bringing a whole new set of issues for the city to address and grapple with.

### **Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment**

The City of Orem is required by the State of Utah to have comprehensive affordable housing plan that is updated regularly, to identify Orem-specific barriers to affordable housing as well develop some solutions that might help the City incorporate more of this kind of housing in our community. The plan was developed with help from developers, non-profit organizations, government officials, and other community stakeholders and addresses items such as land use controls, zoning ordinances, the missing middle, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. The State is also requiring to put together a Station Area Plan that addresses the development of housing and other amenities within two miles of the Orem Frontrunner/Transit Station. This will most likely force the hand of leadership and management to allow for more housing in that area. The Council and staff also continue to look for ways to help maintain and seek out residential investment within the City. The City Council has also promised to readdress the State Street Master Plan and see how housing options might fit into the updated plan.

### **Discussion**

The City of Orem will continue to work with other surrounding cities and Continuum of Care members and use the affordable housing plan as a guide to overcome barriers to affordable housing and evaluate the most effective solutions for the growing housing problem.



## **AP-85 Other Actions - 91.420, 91.220(k)**

### **Introduction**

The City of Orem hopes to maximize the quality of life for its residents through prioritized spending, efficient oversight, and impactful community development.

### **Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs**

The City continues to look for impactful ways to meet the underserved needs in the community and actively seeks other federal and state funding as well as grant and private funding from businesses, financial institutions, foundations, and other entities to help better meet the needs of the community. The City also works to develop local partnerships to better meet area needs.

### **Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing**

While affordable housing is one of the important priorities in our jurisdiction, market forces, rising land and construction costs, NIMBY (not in my backyard) attitudes, political sentiment, and the lack of available property make it hard to address on a large scale. The City continues to look for innovative approaches to better meet the growing housing needs of its residents. Orem is also looking at increasing its senior overlay zone area, changing some zoning laws, lessening lot size requirements, and allowing for accessory dwelling units on back properties as potential ways to bring more affordable housing into the area. The City will continue to work to revitalize older neighborhoods with hopes of increasing homeownership opportunities in those areas and will also work to help homeowners stay in their homes through repair and renovation.

### **Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards**

To reduce the risk of lead-poisoning in Orem households, all potential critical home repair and home rehabilitation projects are evaluated for lead hazards, and where necessary, lead-safe work practices are employed. The critical home repair program can also be used to assist homeowners with mitigation or removal of lead hazards. The City also has a lead based paint provision in all sub-recipient and city department agreements. The City also provides information about services to sub recipients and others, including lead testing and contractors who have been trained in lead-safe practices. The City offers brochures to contractors and others that come to apply for building permits. The City is also looking at partnering with the Utah County Health Department and other service providers on a Green Healthy Homes initiative that would help the community better address lead and other health related housing issues.

### **Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families**

The City hopes to reduce the number of poverty-level individuals and families by targeting CDBG funds to public services that foster self-sufficiency. Orem consistently uses CDBG funding to support programs in the community targeted to low income families to provide access to affordable healthcare, mental health services, youth services, financial education and more. Orem is also excited to continue some of its community initiatives to encourage reading in Title One schools and help children and parents become more safe, connected, and confident through the EveryDay Strong program. The City also plans to pursue developing Communities that Care and Circle programs and expand its homeless and mental health efforts.

### **Actions planned to develop institutional structure**

Through the recent transition of CDBG administration from city staff to MAG, more time and expertise are available to devote to the structure of the CDBG program. This transition will strengthen and evolve the structure of the CDBG program through experience, best practices, collaboration, and training. This will ensure that the program is efficient and effective and making a difference for those in need in the community.

### **Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies**

The City of Orem will continue to work to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies through focus meetings and strategic discussion. The City hopes these types of collaborations will help bring more affordable housing and other support services to the area. The City is looking forward to working with a non-profit organization on the renovation of the home next to the water tank/park project and continue its Big Sweep revitalization partnerships with Fuller Center for Housing and Habitat for Humanity.

### **Discussion**

Insufficient funding and rising demand for affordable housing and public services makes it necessary for the City of Orem to partner with community organizations in innovative ways to meet the needs of the community and provide a good quality of life for its residents. The City will continue to strengthen its CDBG program internally while looking for community partnerships to help meet area priorities and needs in the future.

## **Discussion**

We estimate that 81% of this year's funding will be used for activities that benefit LMI persons. The City of Orem is committed to use at least 70 percent of its CDBG allocation to benefit low and moderate income individuals and families. Program income is mostly generated from payments and payoffs of critical home repair and rehabilitation loans.
