THE WASATCH LOOP

"A 250 MILE UTAH NON-MOTORIZED TRAIL"





The Wasatch Loop Trail Coalition envisions a 250-mile non-motorized trail network connecting Davis, Morgan, Salt Lake, Summit, Utah, Wasatch, and Weber Counties (and everything in between).

An excursion on the loop would take a visitor along the Historic Lincoln Highway or Pony Express Trail. Water attractions are abundant, including the Provo, Jordan and Weber Rivers; Echo, Jordanelle and Deer Creek Reservoirs and of course expansive views of the Great Salt Lake and Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge. The Summit County Historic Union Pacific Rail Trail provides the fascinating history of the mining industry and front door entry into the bustling resort town of Park City. The Bonneville Shoreline Trail at 5,200 ft in elevation gives a peek into the geologic history of the Salt Lake

Valley and provides breathtaking views and access to the largest city centers along the Wasatch Front.

The Wasatch Loop will attract all types non-motorized trail use, from the ultra marathoner to the local family out for a casual stroll. Both paved and natural surfaces connect the Wasatch Front to the rural valleys and towns of the Wasatch Back.



An impressive 78% of the state population (3 million residents), will have proximate access to the Wasatch Loop which in turn connects to additional miles of trails within surrounding Uinta-Wasatch-Cache National Forest and State Parks.









is a voluntary effort between organizations advocating and planning for public trails. These entities, together and independently, created the first 168 miles of the Wasatch Loop and have formed the Coalition to collaboratively construct the remaining 82 miles. Participants include local, state and federal agencies along with Mountain Trails Foundation, Mountainland AOG, Utah State Parks and Recreation, Utah Bicycle Coalition, Weber Pathways, PRATT, Trust for Public Lands and others who champion non-motorized trails in Utah.
